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MARITIME SECURITY

THE FROZEN FRONTIER'S HIDDEN THREAT - CYBERSECURITY IN THE ARCTIC'S NEW ERA

The Arctic's rapid development as a shipping and research hub brings new cybersecurity challenges, especially with limited infrastructure and growing geopolitical tensions. A major threat is the potential sabotage of undersea data cables, highlighted by the emergence of deep-sea cable-cutter technology. The region's harsh environment complicates the detection and repair, making attacks more disruptive. Experts urge a multi-layered approach which would include investing in resilient infrastructure, international cooperation, robust cybersecurity, and rapid response capabilities to safeguard Arctic operations.

HOUTHI THREATEN SHIOPWNERS CARRYING US CRUDE IN THE RED SEA

The Houthi Humanitarian Operations Coordination Center, through a declaration, has prohibited movement of US crude oil exports via the Red Sea, directly threatening shipowners transporting the American oil. This escalation has occurred despite a recent US-Houthi ceasefire, reflecting the ongoing risks for vessels in the region. The Houthis' actions are part of a broader campaign targeting ships linked to the US, UK, and Israel, further destabilising global shipping and raising security concerns for maritime trade through this vital route.

ILLEGAL SUPPLIES TO FOREIGN SHIPS BUSTED OFF PARADIP COAST, LAKHS SEIZED IN MIDNIGHT OPERATION

Paradip Marine Police busted a covert operation which was supplying goods illegally to foreign ships anchored offshore. Smugglers used fishing boats from the Nehru Bungalow Fishing Harbour to transport industrial pipes, motors, and other materials mid-sea without customs clearance, causing significant revenue loss. Acting on a tip-off, police conducted a late-night raid, seizing equipment worth around Rs 10 lakh and arresting three individuals. One suspect remains at large as authorities continue their investigation into the smuggling racket.

ROBBERIES CONTINUE IN SINGAPORE STRAIT WITH SIX SHIPS HIT IN MAY

In May 2025, the Singapore Strait experienced six ship robberies, contributing to a total of 50 incidents this year—significantly higher than the 14 incidents during the same period in 2024. Most attacks occurred near Phillip Channel's eastbound lane and involved armed criminals. Although no crew members were harmed, theft of engine parts and increased weapon sightings are concerning. ReCAAP calls for enhanced patrols, surveillance, and cooperation among regional States to address the growing threat.

SECURITY MEASURES RAISED TO MARSEC LEVEL- 2 OF ALL SHIPS, PORTS

India has raised security at all ports, terminals, and ships to MARSEC Level 2, indicating a heightened threat environment. This move comes amid escalating regional tensions and follows intelligence warnings of potential maritime attacks. Enhanced measures include stricter access controls, increased surveillance, and readiness protocols for all maritime assets. Authorities urge vigilance and cooperation from port operators and shipping companies to ensure safety and to prevent any security breaches during this critical period.

MARITIME FORCES

HMS DAUNTLESS COMPLETES AIR DEFENCE EXERCISE DURING CARRIER STRIKE GROUP 25 DEPLOYMENT

HMS Dauntless, a Type 45 destroyer, completed an air defence exercise (ADEX) as part of Carrier Strike Group 25's deployment, showcasing her ability to protect the task group from aerial threats. The exercise included a flypast by an F-35B Lightning jet, demonstrating the ship's advanced Sea Viper missile system, which can neutralise multiple high-level threats. Previously, Dauntless successfully destroyed a drone swarm during live-fire drills, highlighting her vital defensive capabilities.

SEEING DOUBLE: CARRIER STRIKE GROUP TO TEAM UP WITH ITALIAN FORCE ON FIRST BIG TEST

Carrier Strike Group 25 (CSG25), led by *HMS Prince* of Wales, is teaming up with Italy's ITS Cavour for Exercise Med Strike off southern Italy—their first major joint test. The exercise brings together two carrier strike groups, 21 warships, 41 jets, and over 8,000 personnel to hone anti-submarine and other warfare skills. This marks a significant phase of CSG25's eight-month Indo-Pacific mission, demonstrating NATO's solidarity and the UK's commitment to regional security.

WITH NEW ZEALAND THE LATEST TO JOIN, THE PHILIPPINES IS BUILDING A NETWORK OF DEFENCE PARTNERS AMID SOUTH CHINA SEA TENSIONS

New Zealand has signed a Status of Visiting Forces Agreement with the Philippines, enabling joint military exercises to strengthen Manila's growing network of security partners in response to persistent Chinese maritime threats. This deal follows similar agreements with the US, Australia, and Japan. Furthermore, it reflects the Philippines' frustration with limited support from ASEAN and its slow progress on regional security. With the US alliance's reliability under scrutiny, the Philippines is increasingly favouring bilateral partnerships to bolster its defence capabilities.

CTF 152 CONDUCTS SOLAS EXERCISE WITH FOUR NATIONS

On April 27, 2025, Combined Task Force (CTF) 152 led a multinational SOLAS (Safety of Life at Sea) exercise in the northern Arabian Gulf, with representation from the naval and coast guard units from Iraq, Kuwait, the UK, and the US. Following a water landing by an aircraft, the drill simulated a search and rescue operation, which enhanced coordination, communication, and leadership capabilities. The exercise strengthened regional unity and demonstrated the commitment to safeguarding lives and maritime security.

The Combined Maritime Forces (CMF), a 46-nation naval partnership, hosted its 2025 Maritime Security Conference in Manama, Bahrain from May 12-14. INDIA TO EXPORT 4.12 LAKH TONNES OF GREEN HYDROGEN DERIVATIVES TO JAPAN, SINGAPORE

India will export 4.12 lakh tonnes (412,000 tonnes) of green hydrogen derivatives—including green ammonia and methanol—to Japan and Singapore as part of its push to become a global leader in clean energy sector. The agreements, facilitated by the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy, mark a significant milestone for India's green hydrogen sector. This move is expected to boost India's renewable energy exports and strengthen international partnerships in the transition to sustainable fuels.

COCHIN SHIPYARD STRENGTHENS TIES WITH DRYDOCKS WORLD TO DEVELOP SHIP REPAIR CLUSTERS IN INDIA

Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL) and Drydocks World, a DP World company, are deepening their partnership to develop ship repair and offshore fabrication clusters across India. INDIA APPROVES THREE MORE RUSSIAN INSURERS TO COVER SHIPS AT ITS PORTS

India has approved three additional Russian insurers—Sberbank Insurance, Ugoria Insurance Group, and ASTK Insurance Company—to provide marine insurance for vessels entering Indian ports, their approval valid until February 20, 2026. This brings the total recognised Russian insurers to eight, enabling Russia's oil exports to India amid Western sanctions and restrictions. These insurers, though not part of the International Group of P&I Clubs, offer an alternative for Russian oil shipments, facilitating trade flows despite global regulatory pressures.

SURGE IN SHIPMENTS FROM CHINA MAY BE SHORT-LIVED, INDUSTRY WARNS

A recent surge in shipments from China, driven by easing US tariffs and frontloading, has temporarily boosted freight demand and rates. However, industry experts warn this growth may be short-lived due to fragile economic recovery, looming protectionist measures, and market adjustments. Once frontloaded shipments are completed and new shipping capacity arrives, trade volumes and freight rates are expected to decline, with forecasts predicting negative container growth and a slowdown in global shipping activity in 2025 and beyond.

ACT NOW OR WAIT CENTURIES: MARINE RESTORATION SUCCESS HINGES ON IMMEDIATE INTERVENTION

Marine habitats face severe threats from trawling, pollution, and the expansion of seabed mining, with 66% of coastal areas already degraded. While the UN aims to protect 30% of oceans by 2030, experts warn that this alone is insufficient. While active restoration—such as replanting seagrass and stabilising seafloors—can significantly accelerate the recovery, passive methods may take centuries. Success depends on restoration methods, ongoing maintenance, site selection, and supportive policies, funding, and technology, making immediate intervention crucial.

LOSS OF SEA ICE ALTERS THE COLORS OF LIGHT IN THE OCEAN

New research shows that the loss of sea ice due to global warming not only increases the amount of light entering polar oceans but also changes its colour, shifting from a broad spectrum under ice to a blue-dominated spectrum in open water. This affects photosynthetic organisms like ice algae and phytoplankton, potentially altering species composition and impacting the entire Arctic food web. The findings highlight the need to consider light spectra in climate models.

DATABASE REVEALS VITAL OCEAN LINKS TO AID CONSERVATION

Scientists have launched the Migratory Connectivity in the Ocean (MiCO) database, an interactive global map displaying the migratory patterns of over 100 marine species—including birds, mammals, turtles, and fish—using data from more than 1,300 sources. MiCO connects nearly 2,000 crucial habitats, highlighting the need for international cooperation to protect species that traverse national and high seas waters. The tool supports global conservation efforts and informs treaties by revealing critical cross-boundary connections essential for effective marine protection.

'IT'S A BARRIER DIVIDING US': HOW A CONCRETE SEAWALL SPLIT THIS JAPANESE ISLAND VILLAGE

A planned 180m-long concrete seawall at Katoku beach on Japan's biodiverse Amami Ōshima island has sharply divided the local community. Proponents argue that it is essential for protection against coastal erosion and typhoons, while opponents—including ecologists and many residents—warn it threatens endangered species and delicate ecosystems. Critics advocate for nature-based solutions like planting local species. The controversy highlights global tensions between hard infrastructure and natural defences as climate change intensifies coastal risks.

MARINE-BIODEGRADABLE POLYMER DECOMPOSES BY 92% IN ONE YEAR, RIVALS NYLON IN STRENGTH

A Korean research team has developed a high-performance polyester-amide (PEA) polymer that biodegrades by more than 92% within one year under real marine conditions—significantly outperforming current biodegradable plastics. The PEA matches nylon's strength and flexibility, is recyclable, and can be produced using existing manufacturing infrastructure. Made from castor oil derivatives and recycled nylon waste, it also reduces CO₂ emissions by two-thirds, offering a promising solution to marine plastic pollution and aiming for industrial adoption soon.

IOS SAGAR IN PORT VICTORIA, SEYCHELLES

INS Sunayna (IOS SAGAR) arrived at Port Victoria, Seychelles, on May 1, 2025, after completing an EEZ surveillance mission in Mauritius. The visit, part of India's SAGAR initiative, includes professional exchanges, cultural activities, and joint exercises with Seychelles Defence Forces, strengthening regional maritime cooperation. The ship carries a multinational crew from nine nations, highlighting India's commitment to security and capacity-building in the South-West Indian Ocean. The deployment also included stops in Tanzania, Mozambique, and Mauritius.

INDONESIA PARLIAMENT SET TO RATIFY SEA BOUNDARY WITH VIETNAM, LAWMAKER SAYS

Indonesia's parliament is set to ratify a landmark agreement with Vietnam establishing their exclusive economic zone (EEZ) boundaries in the South China Sea after 12 years of negotiations. The deal resolves longstanding disputes over overlapping claims and illegal fishing, clarifying rights and responsibilities of both nations. The agreement, based on the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS), also signals a united stance against China's expansive maritime claims in the region.

GERMANY, PHILIPPINES SIGN DEFENCE AGREEMENT

Germany and the Philippines have signed a new defence cooperation agreement to enhance military ties and joint activities as Manila strengthens alliances amid ongoing disputes with China in the South China Sea. Signed in Berlin by Defence Secretary Gilberto Teodoro and Minister Boris Pistorius, the deal expands collaboration to the areas of cybersecurity, defence equipment,

logistics, and UN peacekeeping. This pact adds to the Philippines' growing network of defence partners beyond its traditional US alliance.
